
CALL Spring 2023 Synopsis

This is followed by the American Revolution, and the War of 1812. We will study the birth of the "Cotton South" and religion in the South, from Anglicanism to Evangelicalism. We look at conflict in the South, the arguments for and against slavery, and the daily life of enslaved people, finishing in 1850.

Book and Discussion

This class will be a six-week 'book club' and our text will be *The Color of Law* by Richard Rothstein. His subtitle tells it all: "A Forgotten History of How Our Government Segregated America." In contrast to the common view that housing segregation was natural or inevitable, the author presents evidence from federal, state and local jurisdictions to demonstrate their complicity and initiative in the project. Even today, the U.S. Supreme Court regards segregation as "de facto" and thus beyond the reach of legal remedy.
