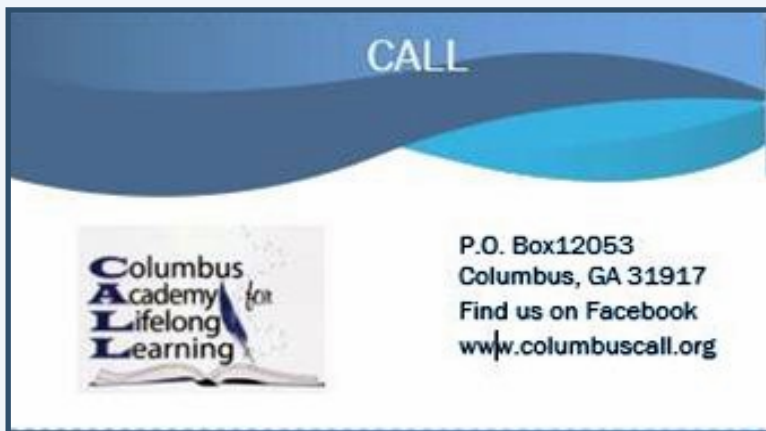

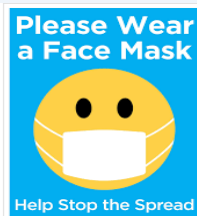
We want to thank the curriculum committee for their help in putting together this Fall quarter's opportunities for you to learn and enjoy many interesting topics.

take place at CSU's EBTC.

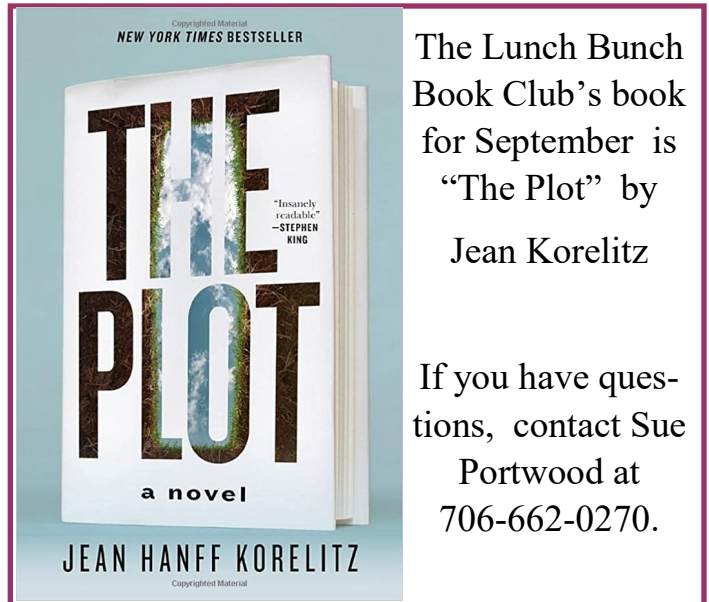
The Curriculum Committee will meet on

Out-of-Town Field Trip

“The Ocmulgee Mounds”

October 14th. Bus will leave at 8:00 a.m.

Step back in time and visit this Native American site. Ocmulgee has had 17,000 years of continuous human habitation and artifacts from the past are still present today.

The Earth Lodge was once the Counsel or Ceremonial Chamber of the Mississippian people of the Macon plateau. The walls and ceiling were reconstructed in 1937. However, the floor is original and was constructed by the Mississippian people in 1015 AD.



Built between 900 - 1100 AD, The Great Temple Mound originally had a dirt ramp that led to a prominent structure built on the top of the mound.



Explore the museum with over 2,000 artifacts and watch an informative orientation film. Then see the Earth Lodge with its original floors, and other mounds

The Fall Social and Intown Trip

A Springer tour, guided by our own CALL member Carla Stickles, Friday October 21st, followed by a buffet lunch at the Rankin Den on 10th St. at First Ave. The cost is \$20 which is payable to CALL at registration. This covers the tour, lunch and bus. We will meet at CSU at 10:00 and ride the bus to avoid parking issues.



When the Springer opened in 1871, it was the grandest theatre between New York and New Orleans, so it served as a venue where shows traveling from the Big Apple to the Big Easy could perform and recoup some of their travel expense.

Columbus was a port town and an average of 100 boats a day touched its piers taking raw goods like cotton down the Chattahoochee River to markets around the world or bringing the most celebrated performers of the late 1800s and early 1900s to perform in the Springer's Edwardian splendor.

The Springer is a National Historic Landmark, one of only seven U.S. theatres with that designation.

Today, the Springer Opera House hosts performances year-round on two stages. Emily Woodruff Hall, the 700-seat main theatre, hosts the popular Mainstage Series which features some of the nation's newest plays and musicals as well as timeless Broadway-style productions.

The McClure Theatre, the Springer's more intimate space, hosts its Studio Series as well as its Children's Theatre Series, featuring many of the area's talented student actors.
